Results of Regional Outdoors Survey

The Survey

The survey was self administered and addressed the following questions:

How do you rate the organisation of the event?

How do you rate the interpretation/guiding at the event?

How do you rate the environment/setting at the event?

How do you rate the facilities (tracks/bridges etc.) at the Park?

Respondents rated each of these factors on a scale from 1 to 5, where 1 was very poor (or unsatisfactory) and 5 was excellent (or very satisfied). They were also invited to explain the reasons for their answers to identify the positive and negative influences on their experience. Participants were asked to specify how they heard about the event, the area where they resided, whether they had visited the Park before, and their gender and age. This information gives us a demographic profile of the people participating in the events to compare with other visitor surveys.

Limitations of the Survey

The survey is not very useful for accurate statistical analysis because of variable sample numbers returned. However, the survey results give useful indicative information such as which promotional methods were most successful, the demographics of participants, average scores of levels of satisfaction, and the percentage of newcomers to the parks due to the Regional Outdoors programme.

Survey Results

The survey results reflect good general satisfaction in all areas (4.8 average out of a maximum of 5).

The survey indicates that most people heard of the events from the Regional Outdoors Programme (25%) which we mailed to previous participants and made available from libraries and visitor information centres. The Evening Post (6%) and Contact (8%) appear to be most effective for newspaper advertising — although the Hutt News, Upper Hutt Leader and Kapiti Observer worked well for local events in their areas. Elements (8%) and the WRC web-site (4.5%) were other popular sources of information.

Participants were fairly evenly distributed from across the Region - Kapiti (28%), Lower Hutt (23%), Upper Hutt (23%), and Wellington (15%). Individual parks generally had good attendance from local residents.

Some 32 percent of participants' were newcomers to the park or forest.

The survey shows a reasonably even gender spread in most areas with 42 percent of participants male and 58 percent female, similar proportions to other surveys.

The survey shows a fairly even age range of participants overall, with low numbers in the 15-19 and 20-29 age groups. In previous park surveys, the 30-39 and 40-49 age groups accounted for around 45 percent of visitors. However, in the Regional Outdoors survey these age groups comprised 28 percent of visitors and the 50-59 and 60+ age groups made up 60 percent. We had high numbers of visitors in the 50-59 and 60+ age groups.

Participants' Comments

This sample of the range of comments from participants indicates that they enjoyed their experience:

- Great staff, full of enthusiasm. Great encouragement to get out of doors, great walk great fun.
- Worth revisiting great wetland eco system!!! Great tea facilities! Impressed that you brought portaloos. A hidden treasure of Wellington well worth more than one visit. [East Harbour lakes]
- Having done commercial "rain forest" visits in Queensland I am very impressed at this experience much more professional than Australia. [Rainforest, Kaitoke]
