The Division's funding position at the end of October was \$234,000 favourable due to the timing of Western river maintenance programmes. The additional revenue and expenditure to budget mostly related to the Waiwhetu clean-up project.

The overall CAPEX position at August was \$588,000 under budget due to timing of expenditure for the Waiwhetu flood improvements.

The full year funding forecast to 30 June 2010 for the Catchment Management Division is expected to be close to budget. The large forecast variances for income and expenditure represent offsetting amounts for the Waiwhetu clean-up.
